Word for The Week:

his disciples spoke about many things. John's Gospel in particular tells us a lot about what Jesus taught them that night. But the thing which has really stuck in the Church's memory from that night is not so much a teaching, but a meal. Because only Jesus could give us Holy Communion. After all, thousands of years before Jesus, Moses taught us to love God with all our hearts and to love our neighbour as ourselves (Deut 6:4-5, Lev 19:18). Almost all of the prophets remind us of our obligation to care for the poor and the marginalised. If he had wanted to, God could have sent John the Baptist to speak in parables or to tell us to turn the other cheek. But nobody other than Jesus could have given us Holy Communion.

That's because in Holy Communion, Jesus doesn't just give us a teaching (though it teaches us many things). In fact, one of the things it teaches us is that we needed more than just a Teacher to be saved from our sins! In Holy Communion, Jesus gives us what we most desperately need and what he alone can give: himself.

Read Mark

Mark 14:43-52 (NIV)

⁴³ Just as he was speaking, Judas, one of the Twelve, appeared. With him was a crowd armed with swords and clubs, sent from the chief priests, the teachers of the law, and the elders. ⁴⁴ Now the betrayer had arranged a signal with them: "The one I kiss is the man; arrest him and lead him away under guard." ⁴⁵ Going at once to Jesus, Judas said, "Rabbi!" and kissed him. ⁴⁶ The men seized Jesus and arrested him. ⁴⁷ Then one of those standing near drew his sword and struck the servant of the high priest, cutting off his ear. ⁴⁸ "Am I leading a rebellion," said Jesus, "that you have come out with swords and clubs to capture me? ⁴⁹ Every day I was with you, teaching in the temple courts, and you did not arrest me. But the Scriptures must be fulfilled." ⁵⁰ Then everyone deserted him and fled. ⁵¹ A young man, wearing nothing but a linen garment, was following Jesus. When they seized him, ⁵² he fled naked, leaving his garment behind.

Holy Communion

This week, and for the two Communion on 20^{th} October and 3^{rd} November, we are trialling a returning to the traditional Anglican practice of sharing wine from a common cup.



Do please share your own thoughts and feelings about this with Raymond, Ed or someone on the PCC. The next PCC meeting will review the trial and decide whether to continue or not.

Those administering the cup will make sure the cup is properly wiped after each communicant has touched it.

If you do not feel it is appropriate for you to consume wine from a common cup (eg for personal health reasons, or because you have a cold):

- please be assured that receiving the bread alone is sufficient for you to have fully participated in this sacrament
- we invite you to take the cup briefly (without consuming wine) or to just touch the cup as it is offered to you. Either of these actions is a 'participation in the blood of Christ' (see 1 Cor 10:16).
